





From the Visitation of the county of Lancaster, A. D. 1613.




HOLT PEDIGREE.

From the Visitation of London, 1633-4.


Arms—Argent on a bend engrailed Sable three fleurs-de-lis of the first, a mullet within a crescent for difference.


Crest—An arm erect, couped at the elbow, habited per pale Azure and Gules, in the hand Argent, a pheon Sable.







c	<p>Sir John Holt, * Knt., born 20 Dec., Anne, dan. of Cropley, of Clerkenwell, sister of Sir John Cropley, Bart., died 26 Jan., 1712, buried at Redgrave.</p> <p>1642, at Thame, Oxfordshire, Gentleman Commoner of Oriol College, Oxford. In 1658, he became a member of the Society of Gray's Inn, Knighted 1686, Lord Chief Justice of King's Bench 1689, admitted a member of the Privy Council the same year. He declined the Chancellorship offered to him on the removal of Lord Somers, in 1700. Purchased Redgrave. Died at his house in Bedford Row, 5 March, 1709, burd. at Redgrave, 20 March, 1709-10, ob. <i>s. p.</i></p> <p>Rowland Holt, Esq., of Redgrave, aged 12, 1664, Chief prothonotary of Court of King's Bench, 1696, died 11 Feb., buried at Redgrave, 18 Feb., 1719.</p> <p>Prisca, dan. of Augustine Ballow, of London, merchant. Marriage licence dated 19 Dec., 1689.</p> <p>Arms—Azure a star of eight points wavy Or, between three keys Argent. * On Chief Justice Holt's monument, on north side of chancel of Redgrave church, are these arms:—Holt, Argent on a bend engrailed Sable 3 fleur de lis of the field, impaling Ermine on a chief Gules three owls Argent, Cropley. Crest, an arm erect, vested per pale Argent and Sable, in the hand a pheon Or. The following arms are on achievements in Redgrave church:—1, Holt impaling Cropley; 2, Holt, impaling Azure, a star Or between three keys erect Argent, Ballow; 3, Holt, impaling Parsons, Gules two chevrons Ermine between three eagles displayed Or; 4, Holt, impaling Argent two bars, and in chief three mullets Gules, Washington.





HOLT WILLS.

1638, July xi.—John Holte, thelder, of Bury Seynt Edmuds. To Jane my wyff, all my copyhold wthin the town of Bury Seynt Edmud & Moche Honyngzerth, for terme of lyff. Executors, the said Jane my wyff & John Drury, of Rowham, esquier. Subscribed in presence of John Holte, hys son'e, &c. By a codicill, "to John my son'e, my best gowne, thre harneys, w^t all their app'tenanc, iiii holberks or armor bylls, whon polax, and all such instruments as p'teynyd to my offic for the Ass, Sess, & suche lyke tymys. Item, to Robert my son'e, my gowne furryd w^t blake lambe, my fox furryd gown, my dublet w^t damaske slevys, and my best cappe." Prob. 29 Aug., 1639.

1661-2.—Will of Robert Holt. Dated 2nd Sept., 5th Edw. VI, at Whelth'm, in the county of Suffolk. To th' use of the poore people of the p'she of Seynt Jamys, in Bury St. Edmund's, fourtie shillings; and in lyke man'r I give to ye use of ye poore in Whelth'm where I dwell, tenne shillings. To John Holte, my brother, and to Wyllyam Wylkyns, my brother in lawe, and to their heyres, the rever'n of my capitall messuage after the death of Johana Barwell, my wife's mother, situate in the towne of Bury aforesayd, with all the landes thereto belonging. To every of my wife's sonnes, twentie markes. To Christopher Holte, my kinsman, tenne poundes. To every of my sister Wylkins' children, fyve poundes, and eyther of them a mylche cowe. To Elizabeth Holte, my neece, tenne poundes, to be payd at the daye of her mariage. To her systers Ann, twentie nobles and two mylche kyne. To my sister Wylkins, thre of my best mylche kyne. To my brother Wylkins, my yonge browne horse, and to my brother John Holte, my yonge blacke horse, and all my bookes of every sort. To John Tyndale, a mylche cowe. To Ann Brett, my wife's kinswoman, fyve poundes. To my brother Aylott Holte, one of my longe gownes, &c. To my brother Wyllyam Holte, my black gowne. The residue of all goods, chattells, lands, &c., to my wife Elizabeth. John Holte and William Wylkins Executors. Pr. 20 November, 1552.

1555.—Jane Holt, of Bury St. Edmund's, widow. To be buryed in the churche of or lady in Bury, nere vnto my mother. To my nece Margery Downys, a rynge of gold called a hope, &c. To my daughter in law, Alis Wilkins (*inter alia*), two quishins w^t redde bucks.

1669.—Will of John Holt, of Bury St. Edmund's. Dated eleventh yeare of Elizabeth. Leaves the two tenementes situate against the south side of St Mary's church, in Bury St. Edmund's, in trust to Harry Collyn and Anne his wife and to their heires, to the intent that they be inhabited by poor people for ever, and a third house adjoining, to be let at a reasonable value, and the rent applied to the maintenance, &c., of the almes houses as above given. To Anne my wife, twenty poundes, twentie combes of wheate, twentie combes of rie, and fouretie combes of maulte, to be payde and delivered within one monneth next after

my decease. Also, during her life, all the houses, lands, &c., purchased of Edward Wolley, Richard Plumpsteede, and Harrie Powle, with all legal rights minutely detailed, together with the use of all plate, household, stuff, &c., and a yearly annuity, as hereafter described, &c. The same not to be disposed of or wastefully used, whether she marry again or not, and she to have all her linnen, &c., save the bedstead, valance, and irons. To Anthonie Butler, gentleman, and Elizabeth his wife, my daughter, eyght hundred poundes, together with any of my goods and chattels of which they may be possessed at the time of my decease. Also, a house and landes in Newton, and all those landes purchased of James Marques and others, and to their children, two hundred pounda, to be equally divided among them. Also, numerous legacies of clothes to Anthony Butler and Harry Collyn. Anthony Butler to pay £20 a year for a terme of yeares not stated, after which term tenne poundes a yeare to Ann his wite. Item, to Harrie Collyn and Ann his wife, and to the heires of their bodies, all my lands, &c., in Burie Seynt Edmondes, excepte the peece of land next my orchard, which I give to Harrie his sonne and his heires for ever. To the sayd Harrie the elder and his heires, all such parcellis of lande, meadowe and pasture, free and bonde, wch I have in Cokefeild, Lavenham, and Horningsheathe, or in either of them, for and towards the paymente of my debtes and legacies, &c. To John, the sonne of the sayde Harrie, fourtie poundes, to Harry his brother, twentie poundes, and to Robte. their brother, other xxl., &c., &c. To the sonne of Anthonie Butler and Elizabeth his wife, my best gold ring. To John Collyn, my seconde gold ringe. To my daughter Elizabeth, my broche of gold and the leste of my vj ringes in my redd coffer, which I never did were. To my daughter Anne, I give twoo aungells and the bigger of the vj ringes aforesaide. Item, I remytt unto William Holte, my cosin, all the debte that he doth owe unto me, excepte onlie xxxl., &c., and I will myne executors shall deal gentlie with him in receaving thereof as he maye conveniently paie it. To my brother Will'm, my best gowne furred with conye, and to my sister, his wife, xls. To the children of Robert Brundishe, late of Cokefeild deceased, xxl., to be paide in foure yeares. Annuities of forty shillings a year to Edmonde and Edward Reve, and remitting all debts owed by them in respect of Sr Robte. Whitney, late parson at Nowton. To my brother Aylott, a little gold ringe, hanginge wthin my velvett bagge. A ring of gold of the value of xxxs., to each of the following, Christopher Holt and his wife, Sr Clemente Hygham, Knt., and my lady his wife, John Hygham, esquire, his sonne, and Anne his wife, Thomas Baddie, Esquire, Marie his wife, William Hunston, Will'm Hill, Robte. Crowe, Thomas Lucas, Edmond Smythe, gent., Anthonye Jermyu, gent., Sr Ambrose Jermyu, knight, and William Denys, To Sr John Harryson, parsonn of greate Horningsheath, xls., and to Sr John Buckenham, xxxs. All other my landes, &c., not before asygned or bequeathed, I leave to descend to my two daughters and their heires. Harry Collyn and Anne his wife Executors. My wife, Anthony Butler, and Elizabeth his wife, to be supervisors. Witnesses, Thomas Baddie, ffraunces Boldero, William Hill.

1641.—Will of Francis Holte, of London. Dated 16th July, 1641. To the poore of the Parish wherein I may be buried, three poundes. To my honored brother Sr Thomas Holte, Baronett, a ringe of gold of twenty shillings. To my brother Robert Holte, a ringe of tenne shillings. To my neece Clifford, a ringe of goulde of tenne shillings. To my

beloved brother in lawe, Mr. John Higford, one of my blacke clothe sutes and my worst blacke cloake, lyned with velvett. To Mrs. Mary Snowe, tenne pounds. After which, severall legacies of money and books to various servants, and ringes to his executors Mr. John Perkins, of Bonham, in the countie of Berks., gent., and Mr. William Smith, of Hardwell, in the countie of Berks., gent.

1647.—Will of Laurence Holte, citizen and cloathworker, of London. Dated 24 Aug. To be buried in the parish churchyard of Great Burkhill, in the county of Bucks. To the poore of Great Burkhill aforesayde, the some of five poundes, to be paide unto the Collectors or Overseers of the poore of the sayd p'ah. To my brother Anthony Holt, yerely and every yeere during his naturall life, the summe of five poundes, to be paid quarterlv. To Thomas Holt, Anne Holt, and Mary Holt, the sonne and daughters of my sayde brother Anthony Holt, unto each of them the summe of threescore poundes. To my neece francis Bennett, the daughter of my eldest brother Richard Holt, the summe of five shillings, and unto every one of her children the somme of twentie shillings. Legacies to four servants of five pounda a year to buy mourning to wear at his funeral, and to the daughter of one of his servants, Priscilla Harwood, the sum of twenty pounda. To my well beloved wife Alice Holt, my Executrix, hereinafter named, and unto her heires and assignes for ever, all my landes, &c., to enable her to pay my debtes and the legacies by me herein given and bequeathed. The rest and residue of all and singular my goods, chattells, and estate whatsoever not by me herein and hereby given and bequeathed (my debtes being payd and my funerall expenses discharged) I fully and wholly give and bequeath unto my sayd well beloved wife Alice Holt, whom I make my Executrix of this my last will and testament, &c., and I hereby nominate, &c. my loving friends frauncis Mead, Marchant, and my wive's father Arthur Condall, to be Supervisors or Overseers of the same. To each of the above Supervisors, fifty shillings, to buy rings. Signed, in the presence of John Greenwoode, Jno. Benson, and Godfrey Austinson, Senr., the day and year above written. Laurence Holte † his mark.

Memorandum that the 18 day of August, 1647, I, Laurence Holt, citizen and clothworker, of London, &c., doe make and declare this to be a Codicill to my last Will and Testament, by me lately made, that is to say, I give and bequeath to my brother Anthony Holte, the lease of the house wherein he dwelleth in Spittlefields, and all my estate interest and tearme of yeares therein. And whereas I have in my hands the summe of two hundred poundes, wch belongeth to Holt Yorke, George Holt Yorke, and Mary Yorke, the children of my couzen George Yorke, deceased, my will and minde is that the sayde summe of two hundred pounda shall be paid, to the sayd children, or the Survivor of them when they shall severally attain their ages of one and twentie yeares. Also, my will and mind is that my sayd Executrix shall cause a tombe stone to be laid on my grave of the value of five pounda thirteene shillings and foure pence. To my cosin Elias Weston, five poundes to buy a ringe. Laurence Holt † his mark.
